## Pastoral Letter

What's inside the cave?

Recently my three year old son came home from nursery with a picture he had drawn which, to me, was a huge back scribble. Of course, as an interested mother I exclaimed, "Wow, that is amazing! Can you tell me what you've drawn?"

He said, "It's a cave, Mummy."

"A cave? Wow? What's inside the cave?"

"Nothing. It's empty."

"Why is it empty?"

To which, my son replied, as if it were the most obvious thing in the world, "Because Jesus is alive!"

The picture of the empty cave/tomb is now framed on the wall at home. It is significant for me for many reasons, but primarily it is a constant reminder of the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection. It is not easy to put into words or images, as much as we try to, the absolute incomprehensible nature of what happens at Easter.

Throughout the Christian year, oftentimes in our Communion services, we say the words:

Great is the mystery of faith.

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

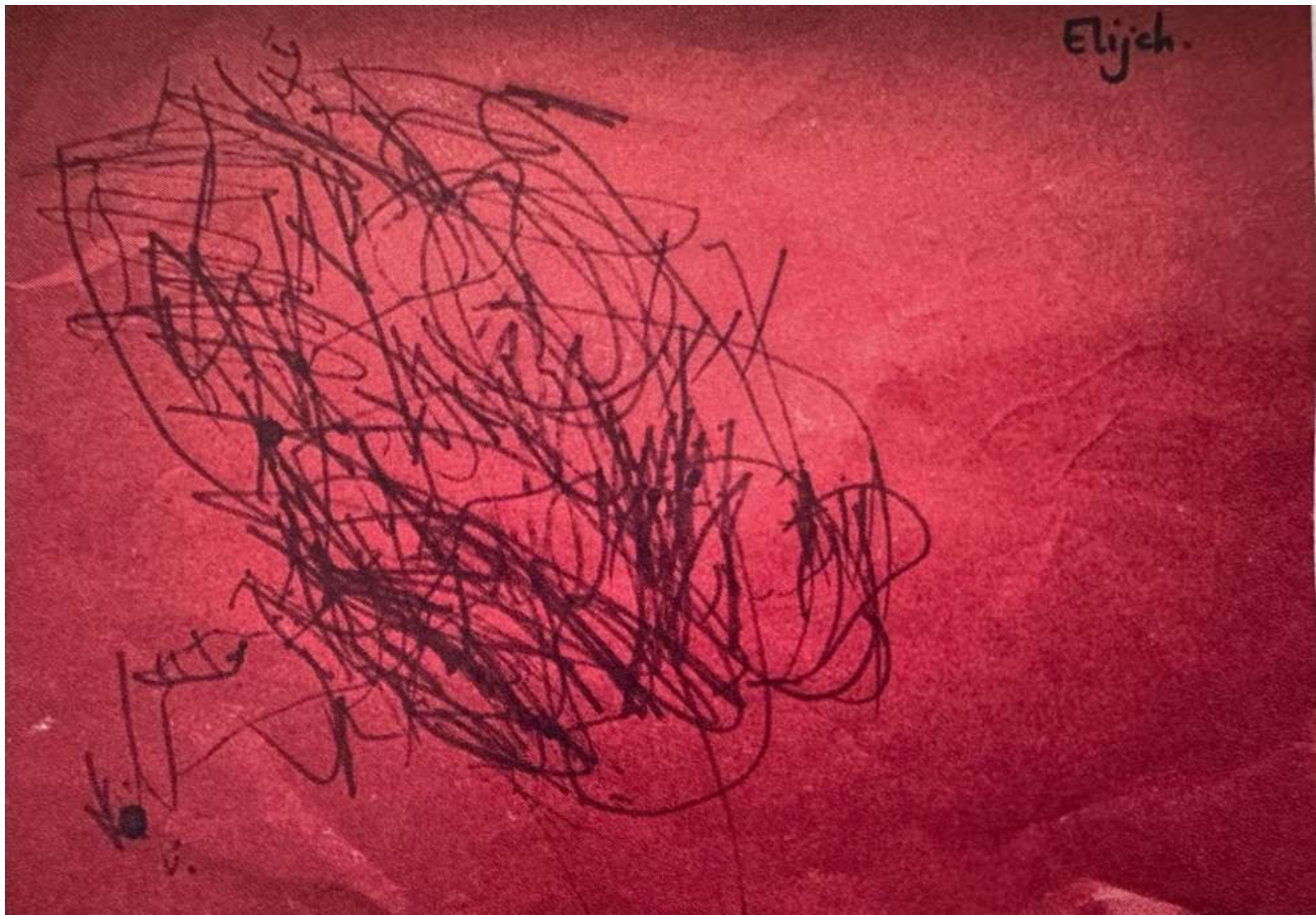
Though we have stories in our Bible of what happened on Palm Sunday or Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday, these events are still shrouded in so much mystery. We have some clear facts and details about these events: the crowds shouting 'Hosannah' as Jesus enters Jerusalem riding on a donkey; the exchange of thirty pieces of silver for information on Jesus's whereabouts; the final words of Jesus as he took his last breath

on the cross; the names of the women who were the first witnesses to the resurrection. And yet, for centuries, people all over the world have asked the big questions of the Easter story – the “why” the ‘how”, the ‘ifs” and the “buts’ and many have tried to answer them.

Whether our understanding of this Easter season feels like a giant scribble, or something more refined, may we be continually drawn into the mystery of Christ’s death and resurrection, seeking to learn and understand, while being content to accept that we may never fully grasp the magnitude of this story.

May you know the remarkable truth that the Easter story reminds us of: that Christ has died for each of us; Christ is risen that we too may rise, and that Christ will come again. How great, and complex and wonderful, and incomprehensible, is the mystery of faith.

**Wychavon District Council want to train local people to champion good mental health within their community.**

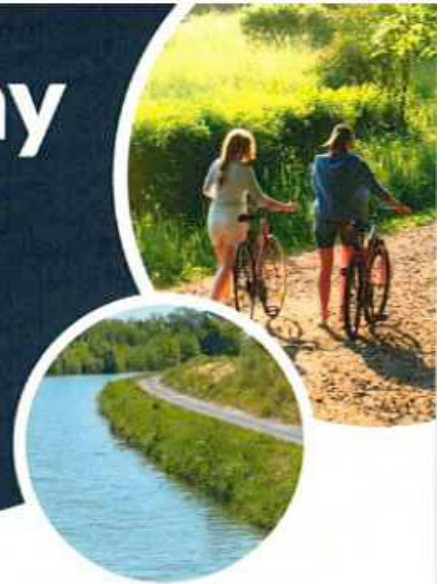
**This won't mean doing anything extra , they are simply offering some training to enhance an individual's skillset.**

# Public Rights of Way in Worcestershire

There are 4604km (2861 miles) of network across Worcestershire, they can be found in towns, villages and the countryside. All Public Rights of Way should be denoted by a signpost or waymark. Some paths may be surfaced in towns but many follow tracks, cross fields or pass through woods in the countryside. The network is managed by the County Council with the help of volunteers

Paths should be signed from the roadside and the route is often waymarked by coloured arrows. Different types of Public Rights of Way can be used by different users:

-  **Footpaths** - indicated by yellow arrows; for use by walkers only.
-  **Bridleways** - indicated by blue arrows; for use by walkers, horse-riders and pedal cyclists.
-  **Restricted Byways** - indicated by plum-coloured arrows; for use by walkers, pedal cyclists, horse-riders and horse drawn vehicles.
-  **Byways** - open to all traffic (BOATS) - indicated by red arrows; for use by walkers, pedal cyclists, horse-riders, horse-drawn vehicles and motor vehicles.

# **County Councillor Report – Pebworth March 2025**

Dear All

Sadly this is my last report to you as County Councillor. I am standing down after 12 years of service, and hopefully you will agree a lot has been achieved in those years.

Here are a few examples.

### **Broadband**

When I first stood for election Pebworth had terribly slow Broadband – most of us were getting 2-4 Mbps – and my first election promise was to improve Broadband. With the County Council's help and funding we managed to get Superfast Broadband (minimum 30Mbps) by installing fibre to the cabinet in Pebworth which gave speeds up to 10 times faster. But although residents in the village were getting Superfast, those on the outskirts in Broad Marston and Ullington were still struggling with low speeds. Again with the help and funding from County Council, Gigafast overhead cabling was installed giving these houses up to 100Mbps. And the latest news is BT/Openreach have plans to bring Gigafast to the whole of Pebworth in the next two years.

### **Roads and Pavements & kerbs**

New pavements have been laid in Front Street, Friday Street, Broad Marston Rd, Chapel Rd and Pebworth Rd. New blue lias stone kerbs were fitted in Front St/Back Lane. New conservation kerbs in Pebworth Rd. Most of the roads have been either patched, re-surfaced or surfaced dressed, and pot holes when they do occur have been repaired promptly.

### **Speeding**

Working with Safer Road Partnerships, mobile speed camera vans now visit the wider area to enforce the speed limits, and new speed limits have been introduced and/or extended. The Highways engineers have

also installed improved signage and some traffic calming measures.

## **Drainage & Flooding**

Flooding was a frequent event in our area and I have spent considerable time in the last 12 years trying to improve the situation. The first success was working with Cala Homes and the District Council to build a flood plain in Wesley Gardens. Since this has been built, Elm Close has not flooded. The next area to be helped was Priory Lane and a major drainage system was installed by Highways – one at the end of Priory Lane, and one at the entrance to Priory Lane, both have made a considerable difference. Then with the help of the then-resident of Broad Marston Manor (Ellie Golding), and the Heart of England Forest, a large flood plain was built by the Railway Bridge on the corner of Mickleton Rd holding back thousands of gallons of flood water. This helped, but further tweaking was required which resulted in a second flood plain being built on land owned by the Priory with the kind help from the current owner. Further improvements to road gullies/ non-return valves/ headwalls/ replacement pipework in Broad Marston and in Pebworth were fitted by Highways. The Parish Council also paid for improvements to the ditches and a modified bridge over a waterway in Broad Marston.

Currently a bund in Broad Marston is being built in a farmer's field to stop water flowing onto the road. Further afield, major work in Honeybourne has occurred to stop the railway bridges and the crossroads flooding.

## **Divisional Fund**

As a County Councillor I have a small amount of money each year to help community groups and Pebworth has benefitted from this fund. Here are a few examples:

Pebworth in Bloom; new lawn mower and signs at each entrance to the village "Regional Winner of Britain in Bloom". Also plants and shrubs for the Biodiversity wetlands and tree shields

Pebworth Bowls Club – new mat and bowls

Village Hall – blinds for Mary's room, and projector screen & projector, and refurbishment of wooden floor

Pebworth Party in the Park – flags & signage

Pebworth Rural Cinema – New fridge shared with the village hall, and a blu-ray player

Coffee of the Close – soup kettle

Pebworth Bell ringers – contribution to a new website

St Peters – contribution to a new notice board

Meon Vale Residents – contribution to their Halloween event

Pebworth School – books

Pebworth Collective – contribution towards the to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee village event

Grant for the York stone for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee commemorative monument in the recreational field.

Honey Tots Playgroup – play equipment

Pebworth PROW volunteers – tools and some kissing gates

Refurbishment of the old telephone box to hold the village defibrillator

Goal posts for the recreational field

Paint for the railings around the village

Contribution for a new marquee for village events

Pebworth village choir – a new electric piano

## **County Council organisation**

I was the chairman of Environment Overview & Scrutiny, and the committee looked at ways to improve the efficiency of the council and there were several major recommendations that have been adopted, such as:

1. the highway drainage map that is on the WCC website which helps report blocked highways drains
2. the frequency of gully cleaning
3. the ways the public can report issues with the highways network and receive better feedback
4. improved flood alleviation schemes and traffic calming

5. faster building of highways infrastructure like roundabouts, zebra crossings and junctions under section 278.

### Update on flood alleviation work

1. Gullies under Honeybourne Bridges - further jetting has been organised to clear outflow pipes to improve the situation. Still awaiting confirmation this has been completed.
2. Now the dry weather is here the bund in farmer's field by the Honeybourne bridges can be extended and completed.
3. Tom Furness has agreed to fit a wide ACO drain at the bottom of Grove Farm drive to prevent run off from the farm onto Stratford Rd which will also help prevent flooding under the bridges.
4. In Broad Marston, the bund in the field opposite Cotswold View can be completed too.
5. Also in Broad Marston, some water was coming onto the road via the kerb gully by Cotswold View. A higher headwall is to be built where the non-return valve is situated by Noleham Brook. No date yet confirmed.

### Highways

- Pavement along Pebworth Rd has been resurfaced last month. Also the drainage from the gullies along this road have also been improved by excavating the outflow. Also the 30mph signs have been repainted on the road.



- Gullies and highway drains by the Church Car Park have been repaired in March. Still some further work needed to investigate the partial blockage somewhere down Back Lane.
- Junctions into Elm Close and into Cherry Lane have been reported for patching
- “Worcestershire” sign-post to be erected at the entrance into Meon View Gardens.

Also can I remind everyone to try and keep the road drains outside their houses free of debris so the drains work effectively. Simply remove any leaves or mud with a brush or spade or even with your wellie! By doing this one minute task, it will help minimise road flooding. Thank you.

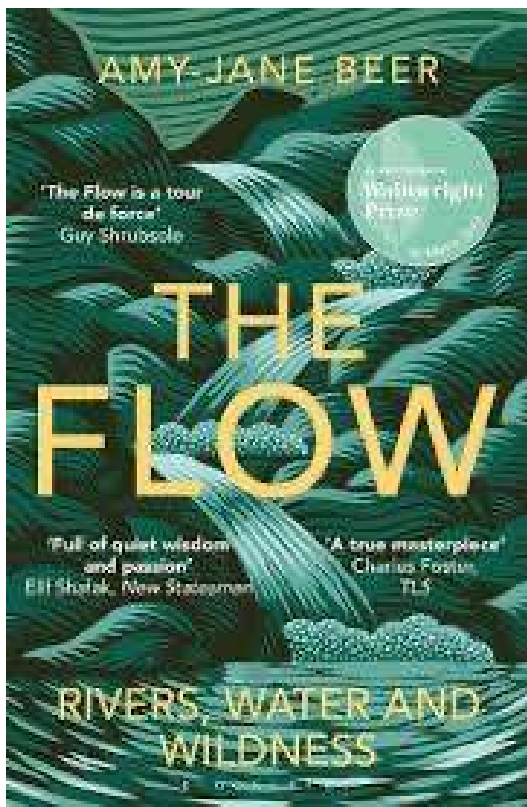

# Water, water everywhere but not a drop to drink!

Water in the British Isles is abundant and as such it's easy to take it for granted. Sadly, we are now paying the price for our neglect of this vital resource. Water infrastructure has suffered years of under investment millions of litres of drinking water is lost in leaks, sewerage systems can't cope, rivers, lakes and the land are all polluted.

We enjoy holidaying in the Lakes. We often stay near Windermere. When there in the summer we swim daily ... Between 2021 and 2023 more than 140 million litres of wastewater was pumped into Windermere at times when it was not permitted. Sewage regularly flows into the Lake not just in storms or after heavy rain but routinely this waste causes algae blooms that remove oxygen from the water and kill the aquatic life.



The Flow by Amy Jane Beer is a book that invites us to pause, reflect and wonder. Amy is a canonist, and her knowledge, love and appreciation of rivers is inspiring and provoking. Through exploring various waterways and water shaped landscapes she brings our focus to whole systems, landscapes, individual creatures and plants. It is a book of shifting focus, moving our attention to variety of subjects and places. A book of related essays woven together that makes a seductive and informative read that shakes us from our torpor - we neglect water at our peril. This beautiful book makes us mindful that although abundant, water is precious. It is vital for our well-being, for life and health. Water is a gift that we should notice, appreciate and cherish.

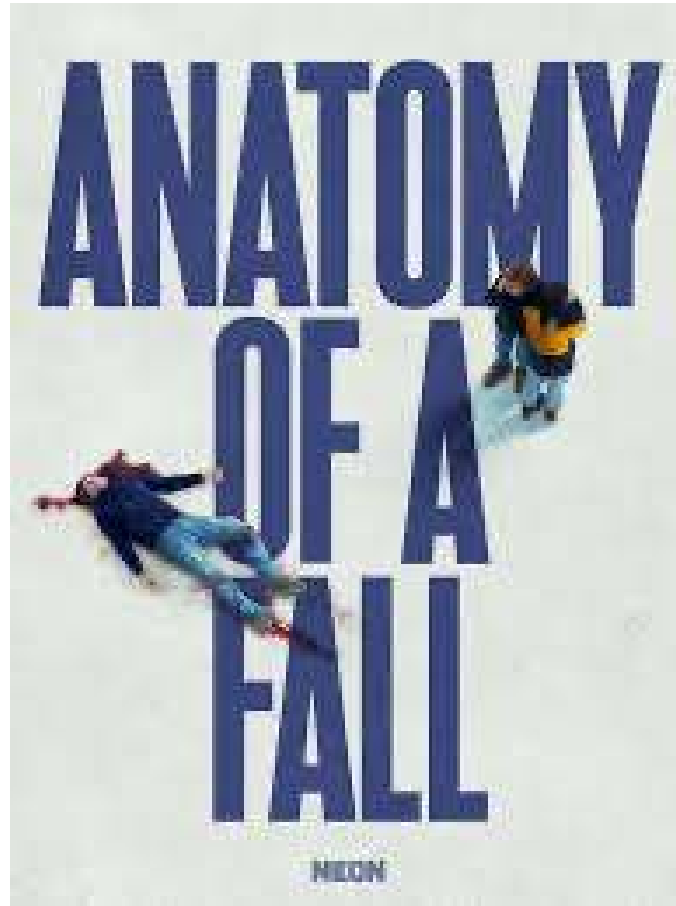

**Edited Minutes of the Ordinary Parish Council Meeting held**  
**At the Village Hall, Pebworth on Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2025**

Present: Councillors: Richard Weller (Chairman), Simon Shiers, James Pearson, Jodi Cotton & Eugene Mccluskey

In attendance: County Councillor Adams, District Councillor Judith Ciotti, Mrs D Bowles (Clerk)

Also in attendance: 1 member of the public.

**Open Forum: The Chairman suspended the formal meeting for the Ward Members and public participation.**

1 member of the public was in attendance:

- It was confirmed the County Council elections would be taking place in May
- Clerk confirmed Safer Neighbourhood Team emails are forwarded to everyone who has subscribed to Pebworth E-News

County Councillor Adams – not present, no report sent

District Councillor Ciotti reported:

- Public hearings to examine the South Worcestershire Development Plan Review (SWDPR) will begin in March at Worcester Guildhall. Government inspectors will assess whether the plan, which outlines housing developments until 2041, meets legal and national planning requirements. The hearings will run from 4 to 27 March, covering various themes, with additional sessions in Pershore on 29-30 April. The public can attend but may only speak if they registered during the 2022 consultation and are invited by the inspector. If approved, modifications will be consulted on in Summer 2025, with final adoption expected by late 2025 or early 2026.
- Wychavon Drainage Engineers are investigating the drainage system at Langate Fields.

**The Chairman closed the open forum and reconvened the meeting at 19:10**

**Planning Matters:**

**Considered:**

- a)W/25/00387/HP Location: Ivy Cottage, Front Street, Pebworth, Stratford Upon Avon, CV37 8XQ Description of Proposal: Replacement of existing windows. Following consideration Clerk to respond “Pebworth Parish Council would like to respectfully remind the Planning Officer that the site is located

within a designated conservation area. Given this status, the Parish Council trust that the special character and heritage significance of the area will be carefully considered in the assessment of the application, in line with relevant local and national planning policies”

b)W/25/00400/FUL Location: Land Adj To Bramble Cottage, Dorsington Road, Pebworth Description of Proposal: Residential conversion of barn including replacement roof and extension, to replace approved barn conversion - (Variation of condition 2 Ref W/22/02615/FUL). Following consideration Clerk to respond “No objection”.

### **Decisions:**

c)W/24/02522/HP Proposal: Garage conversion to form a habitable ancillary accommodation Location: Woodford, 4 Norton Gardens, Pebworth, Stratford Upon Avon, CV37 8YA. Application approved subject to conditions.

### **Council & Community Matters:**

a)Members noted the defib grant funding County Cllr Adams had provided details for has expired. Clerk has applied to London Hearts but no response received to date.

b) Members resolved to respond to the South Warwickshire Local Plan Preferred Options 2025 Consultation, specifically Draft Policy Direction 2 – Potential New Settlements E1 Long Marston Airfield. Members to provide bullet points for Clerk to respond by the morning of Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> March.

c) Members noted the email regarding the Worcestershire Minerals and Waste Local Development Scheme (February 2025 – November 2027) (emailed 24.2.25)

d) Cllr Cotton will provide details to residents of Severn Trent Water’s Community Fund which is currently open for applications.

e) Members noted the update from CALC regarding Devolution. Cllrs Weller & Pearson are attending the CALC session on 31<sup>st</sup> March.

### **Meon Way Gardens:**

a) It has not been possible to meet with Persimmon homes regarding the submission of the consultation responses to the public open space area. Cllr Pearson is in the process of setting up a meeting. He will also bring up the points raised in the last meeting regarding the safety of the Persimmon site. Cllr

Mccluskey has taken photos evidencing the lack of security - unlocked and unopened gate and open windows, although following the theft of a number of fitted boilers security has now been enhanced.

b) Following Cllr McCluskey's organisation of a community litter pick at Bennett's Rise, Meon Way Gardens, it was observed that a significant amount of the litter originated from social housing properties in the area. Clerk to contact Citizen Housing requesting a site visit.

### **Neighbourhood Development Plan:**

a) Cllr Pearson will liaise with the Clerk to finalise the Locality Grant application.

b) Cllr Pearson has contacted Brodie Planning requesting a timeline of the commencement of the NDP review. Once this has commenced, Clerk will initiate the Housing Needs Survey.

### **The Close & Recreation Field**

a) No monthly reports provided.

b) Members discussed the provision of a boules court on the Recreation Field. Clerk to contact the resident requesting they provide further information demonstrating the need for this.

c) Members noted the works on the grill at The Close have now been completed and all debris cleared away. Rooftop Housing has confirmed they will remunerate the Parish Council with half the costs.

d) Members reviewed the recommendations from Heart of England regarding potential planting on the Recreation Field. The suggested tree planting in the proposed area had been previously considered and declined. Cllr Weller will consult with allotment holders regarding their views on hedging around the allotments and report back at the April meeting. Members expressed their support for this initiative and requested the Clerk to contact Heart of England to conduct a survey at The Close.

e) Cllr Pearson provided photos of the surface outside the MUGA. He advised whilst there is some surface cracking he recommended weed spraying to delay further damage.

f) Members noted the picnic benches on The Close have now been installed.

## **Burial Ground :**

a) Cllr Weller spoke in depth with Simply Stone regarding the headstone maintenance quote and proposed that the quote is accepted. This was unanimously approved.

b) Cllr McCluskey has taken some footage of the burial ground using a drone for Clerk to document on Parish Online.

## **Matters Raised by Members:**

The following matters were raised by Council Members for consideration for future agendas:

a) Clerk has received a request for an application form for the Parish Councillor vacancy. Once the application has been received, Cllr Weller to phone to discuss.

b) There is a significant litter problem around the area of Sims Metal (UK) Ltd. Clerk to contact the Company.

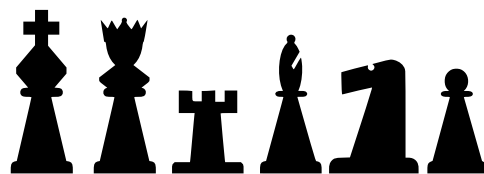
# PEBworth CHESS CLUB
