Pebworth Remembers

Last year our thoughts were with the people of the Ukraine, suffering terribly from Russian aggression, and this year, while that conflict still rages, the people of the Middle East, Israeli and Palestinians, are in our thoughts. Yet again violence has erupted with innocent people, especially thousands of children suffering unimaginable horrors. Peace seems a long way away but the suffering and deaths of so many, especially servicemen and women were remembered at the weekend of 11th and 12th November.

There was a spine-tingling moment on Remembrance Day when the notes of the Last Post died away. As the two minute silence began the large crowd at the memorial area could hear the solemn tolling of a single bell from St Peter's. The simple service at 11am on the 11th November has become a much appreciated tradition and each year more seem to join the Pebworth In Bloom event. The weather was perfect, with a cloudless blue sky and sunshine as the names of the men "dear to Pebworth" were read aloud and as wreaths were laid on behalf of the Parish Council, Scouts and Cubs, West Mercia Police and the WI with hand drawn tributes from children. We are very grateful to Raffe who played the Last Post impeccably, to Simon for his poignant reading of "For the Fallen" and to Liz who led the final prayer for peace. And thank you to Vikki and Rob who welcomed everyone to the Masons Arms for refreshments afterwards.

The weather changed dramatically the next day for Armistice Sunday which was celebrated at St Peter's. Rain and wind greeted the congregation for the annual service of remembrance which was taken by Father Kevin who gave a thought-provoking talk on the need to protect peace from evil doers. The church had been beautifully decorated by Rachel and Sally, and Raffe and Simon once more contributed to the service and along with well-loved hymns. The service was further enhanced by our bellringers. Many stayed for coffee afterwards and the collection this year was donated to the charity "Help for Heroes".

Postscript:

Just when WI members thought the village has always been safe from witchcraft this article was found very recently in "Worcester People and Places"

"At Pebworth, about 1850, there was a White Witch, who had the power of curing by incantation. She is remembered for two cures, one for curing a young woman who from childhood had St Vitus' Dance, the second for the removal of a very bad whitlow (*a painful, infectious skin condition on the fingers, caused by the herpes virus*) which disappeared after muted words and the application of her saliva. Tales were told in the village of furniture travelling from room to room in her house and a pot of broth removing itself from the fire and going into an adjoining room and emptying itself into a basin. The woman was drowned in a pond at Pebworth, whether by accident or as a result of a "trial" is not known".

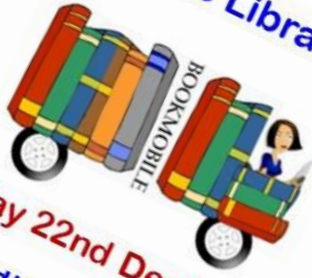

On-call firefighters required for Pebworth Fire Station

Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Service (HWFRS) is looking for more on-call firefighters to cover Pebworth Fire Station.

Anyone interested in the paid role must be aged over 18, live or work within five minutes of the Stratford Road station and be able to respond to emergency calls whenever needed.

The surrounding area includes a maximum-security prison, high-speed railway lines, recycling centres and other local manufacturing businesses found on the industrial sites.

Pebworth is staffed solely by on-call firefighters who are professionals from a wide range of backgrounds which can prove helpful when responding to incidents.

The station boasts a Dennis Sabre fire engine, which is a first-line attack appliance, carrying a crew of up to six firefighters along with



firefighting and rescue equipment.

The building and facilities are still relatively recent having been built in 2011 to replace

the previous structure in Broad Marston Road.

HWFRS is looking to recruit enthusiastic, community-minded applicants from all walks of life for the on-call roles.

The most important qualifications are common sense, compassion, commitment, discretion and teamwork.

Potential firefighters must be available on Tuesday evenings for drill nights which are weekly training sessions at the Pebworth station starting at 7pm.

HWFRS offers a range of contracts where the number of hours and times to be available on-call can vary to suit personal and professional circumstances.

Full training, uniform and personal development are provided alongside many opportunities to gain additional skills and qualifications that will be of use outside the Service.

The Service only asks for an average level of strength and fitness and will provide full support in helping people understand and achieve this.

Apologies Considered for Absence:

Cllrs Shiers and Parkins – approved

Open Forum: The Chairman suspended the formal meeting for the Ward Members and public participation.

- Parking on the dropped kerb by the village hall has caused an issue for residents. Cllr Weller advised the resident to discuss this with the Chair of the Village Hall Committee reminding hall users to be considerate when parking.
- Query regarding planning application which is being discussed under agenda item 6a – resident is concerned regarding the impact of the reduced light to her property.
- Bollard outside Bank House on Front Street is missing. Clerk advised Members the Lengthsman Scheme is unhappy to pay for these works and they should be referred to Highways. Members resolved to pay for any bollard repair work going forward.
- Back Lane - overgrown ivy on a wall causing an issue with visibility. Clerk to write to landowner in the first instance.
- Potholes to be reported on the road from Little Meadows to Ullington crossroads.

- Issues relating to Meon Way Gardens, however, these do not fall under the remit of the Parish Council.
- It was reported that the uptake to events at the village hall has risen. This is due to residents from Meon Way Gardens being more informed.

The Chairman closed the open forum and reconvened the meeting at 19:30

Ward Member's Report:

- a) County Councillor Adams – apologies and report received (Appendix B)
- b) District Councillor Ciotti: Planning Communities Together event being held on 23rd November 6.30pm. All Cllrs invited.

Planning Matters:

Considered:

- a) Elm View, Chapel Road, Pebworth: Demolition of existing dwelling and construction of nine dwellings, creation of new vehicular access into site along with private driveways and gardens, alteration and extension of retained outbuilding at Elm View and alteration and extension of Walnut Tree Cottage. Following discussion, it was resolved to object to this application. Cllr Cranage to draft a response.
- b) Old Granary, 1 Bank Farm Court, Front Street, Pebworth: Change of Use of Highway Land to Private Garden (retrospective). Following discussion, it was resolved for Clerk to respond with “No comment”.

Considered between meetings:

- c) The Forge, Back Lane, Pebworth: A dilapidated, old stable building that is no longer used would be demolished and rebuilt into an outbuilding as a living space with one bedroom and a

kitchen/living room area as open plan for extra accommodation for family use. Cllr Weller declared an interest and did not take part in the email discussion. Following consultation via email Clerk responded with "Pebworth Parish Council has no objection to this application however we do question whether the parking provision is sufficient for the increase in dwelling capacity created by the application as there is no capacity for parking on the street."

- d) Bank Farm, Front Street, Pebworth: Amended design of dwellings. Demolition of existing agricultural barns and replacement with 5no. detached dwellings. The Parish Council had no further comments to make on this application.
- e) New Buildings Farm, Priory Lane, Broad Marston: Full planning application for the demolition of agricultural buildings with Class Q consent and the erection of 5 dwellings. The Parish Council had no further comments to make on this application.

Decisions:

County Councillor Report – Pebworth

Month: December 2023

Dear Residents,
Can I take this opportunity to wish you and your family a very happy Christmas and a wonderful New Year.

There have been many improvements by the County Council around our area in the last 12 months, and I am so glad to see the flood alleviation schemes all seemed to work well during the heavy rain we experienced recently.

NEW drains under the Honeybourne Bridges

The good news, the new drains under Honeybourne Bridges worked well on 19th & 20th October. There was widespread flooding but there was little water under the bridges, and the road was still passable.

BUT as previously mentioned, it is so important to make sure any debris that covers any road gully is removed regularly. Since the flood waters of 20th October, I see a lot of mud and leaves have covered the gully on the LHS under the second bridge as you go towards Pebworth, and on 13th November this caused water to flood across the road. I did ask Owl Homes if it was possible to use their road sweeper to

clean the debris under the bridges; Tom Parriot – Site Manager - at Owl Homes was very helpful and said he was going to instruct the road sweeper to brush under the bridges.

REMINDER - CAN THE PARISH AND RESIDENTS PLEASE CHECK ALL GULLY GRATES ARE CLEAR ON A REGULAR BASIS. Simply sweep or remove debris off the top of the gully grate with a spade or a stiff brush; it only takes seconds to do.

Other updates on flooding – Broad Marston

The flood plain in the Heart of England field on Mickleton Rd/Broad Marston Rd worked well on the 20th Octo 2023 too following the excellent work carried out by the volunteers.

As a consequence, there was hardly any water under the Broad Marston/Holt railway bridge, and the road was still passable.

However a little fine tuning to the inlets into the 2 x Flood plains is needed to help the flood plains take great capacity. I have spoken to Jonathan at Broad Marston volunteers, and a few minutes with a spade will hopefully be all that is needed.

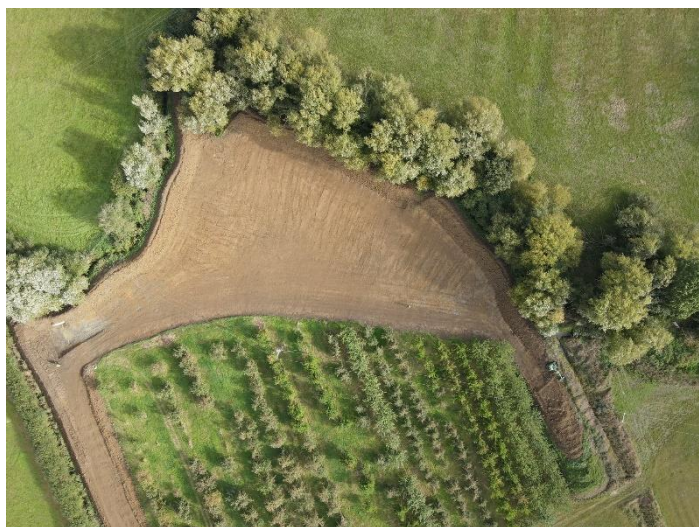
There was some water on the road in front of the Broad Marston Manor entrance, but the road was still passable. This water was mostly coming from the field opposite Cotswold View. A few years ago, the ditch on the right hand side (as you drive out of Broad Marston) was dug out and the soil used to build a bund in the field. This bund has now eroded and disappeared, and in my opinion this ditch needs digging out again, and the soil used to rebuild the bund. I have asked the Pebworth Parish Council to see if there any monies left from the Cala Homes Flood alleviation maintenance fund (£5000) to help clear this ditch. They paid for it last time to be done, and I would strongly recommend they do it again. I spoke to Nick Farmer who did it last time and he is happy to quote to do it again.

Other updates on flooding – Honeybourne

In Honeybourne again there was some water on the road outside the Gate pub but the road was still passable. There was water along the High Street too but it seemed to be coming from the ditch opposite the Gate Inn, and the ditch along the High Street. I had a meeting with WDC flood engineers, and they are going to ask for these ditches to be dug out by the landowners/community. Also some of the

outlets under the raised pavement are to be blocked off on a temporary basis to see if that stops water coming back onto the road from the brook.

The flood plain in the farmer's field upstream of the Gate Pub worked well on the 20th October 2023 following the excellent work carried out by the farmer, Ted Mansfield, over the last 2 years. The flood plain is bigger than 3 football pitches and held back an estimated 10,000 cubic meters of water that evening. Without this flood plain, the junction by the Gate pub would have been about 3 foot deep on the 20th October. See aerial photo showing the size of this flood plain. Once again a HUGE THANK YOU to the farmer in building this flood plain on his land.



Network Rail gives the green light to the new Honeybourne Railway Station Car Park

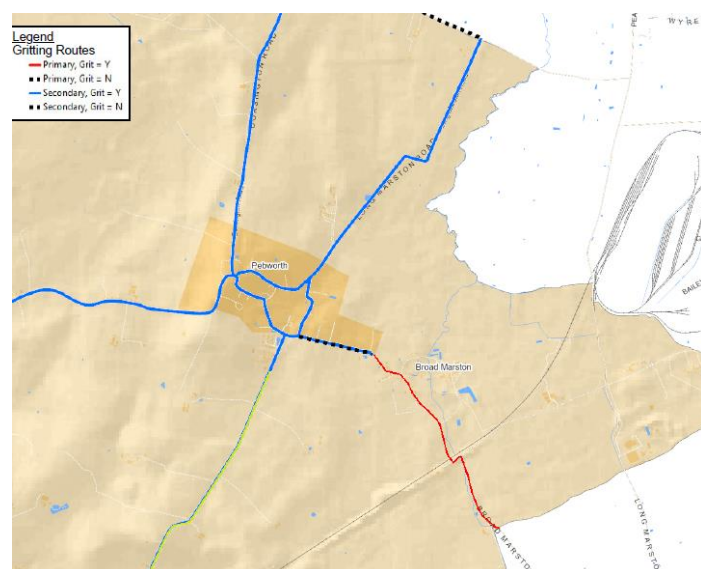
WDC bought some land opposite the platform at Honeybourne Station just off Sheenhill Rd over 4 years ago to build a new railway car park with 200+ parking spaces. Unfortunately, Network Rail wanted £4million from WDC to connect to the existing pedestrian bridge so the project was put on hold. Over the last few years I have held several meetings with representatives from Network Rail and WDC, and started a campaign of writing to the CEO of Network Rail pushing for a cheaper option. The Parish Council, the MD of WDC, and our MP all wrote to the CEO. And at last we have some progress. NR have agreed that a pedestrian level crossing from the new car park to the platform can be constructed over the redundant rail track to Long Marston so the project can go ahead at a much-reduced cost. So hopefully the new Honeybourne Railway Station car

park will be built in the next 12-18 months. Progress has been made in the last month with Network Rail starting to look at designs for the pedestrian level crossing.

Highways:

There are still some road and footway maintenance in progress in Worcestershire please check <https://one.network/> to see all the temporary road closures on a regular basis.

- **I have reported the sunken road opposite the entrance to Pebworth Nursery to Highways.** WCC are going to dig to investigate.
- **Dropped kerbs requested opposite 2, and 3, Chapel Road for mobility scooter.** Awaiting survey and quote
- **I had a meeting in November with Severn Trent and again reminded them about the foul sewer manhole in School Rd and Friday St** which suffer foul water coming up through the manhole when we had the heavy rainfall recently. They have promised to take action.
- **Flooding at Chalk Farm , Buckle Street –** Culvert jetted, but some ditches still need to be dug out by the landowners/residents. Another meeting occurred with residents and WCC & WDC engineers and action plan agreed. Ditch on RHS to be dug out by farmer and new grips dug by WCC
- **Noisy manhole cover opposite the Masons Arms – Repaired By Severn Trent.** Signs to be collected by WCC Ringways.
- **Gritting route extended along Broad Marston Rd**

Also remember a photo of the Highways problem is as good as “a thousand words” so always take a photo where possible.

Ditches – IMPORTANT TO DIG OUT DITCHES TO REDUCE FLOODING

It is the land-owners responsibility to keep their ditches working correctly. At this time of year all ditches should be inspected and where necessary dug out. The bottom of any pipes that feed into the ditches must be clear, and the bottom of the pipe should be above the bottom of the ditch.

Earlier this year a house in Dorsington Rd was flooded at junction with Long Marston Rd. The cause was unmaintained ditches. The good news is the ditches have now been dug out by Heart of England Forest, and all the culverts under the road checked and jetted. On Friday 20th October this house was not flooded. So please keep your ditches clear.

What have we been up to?

Officers have conducted several 'drop in sessions' around the patch. Even if the session is in a village, you are more than welcome to attend a drop-in session to speak with us. This is a great way for you to understand what we are doing in your village, and if there is something that you believe we are not doing, it's a great way to tell us.

Officers attended several Firework displays. No issues were reported at these events.

We attended Cavendish Park Care Home for the launch of their poppy wall. We have also attended various Remembrance services.

Various schools have been attended due to concerns over parking at drop off and pick up times. We are encouraging parents to walk to school when they can and park safely if they can't walk.

During the week of 13th-19th November, West Mercia joined police forces up and down the country to support 'Operation Sceptre' - a week long national campaign aimed at tackling knife crime. Officers have attended various schools to discuss this matter along with conducting knife sweeps in local parks where ASB has been reported.

All of the above is sent through Neighbourhood Matters as well as any engagement sessions we run. We are encouraging people to sign up to this service as it's a great way of finding out what we are up to and where we will be. Please ensure you sign up to this free service.

Drop in Sessions

We now have access to a community engagement van so the team can set up a mobile "office" to allow us to speak with residents and provide advice and crime prevention information.

Keep up to date via Neighbourhood Matters (NHM) for future dates and locations. We have a new community engagement calendar on NHM which will highlight our events.



COURIER FRAUD

Once again we are highlighting Courier Fraud following fresh reports of incidents in the Shropshire area, causing financial loss to victims.

The caller may also be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details about the victim such as their full name and address. The caller will try and build up trust with the potential victim before proceeding.

How does it work?

- The scammer calls you claiming to be from your bank or

as a police officer and will tell you either a fraudulent payment on your account needs dealing with, or sometimes that a person has been arrested using your details and cards

- You may be asked to call the bank back to convince you the call is genuine using the number on the reverse of your card. However, the Scammer has still kept the line open so you are still in touch with the Scammer
 - If you do try to call your Bank back, always wait at least 5 minutes for the line to clear or use another phone
 - They will either ask you for your card PIN number or tell you to key it into the phone – you should never be asked for your PIN or pass it over on the phone
 - The Caller then tells you they will send a Courier to pick up your card – they may often provide a “password” to give to the Courier to make it sound even more genuine
- Once they have your card and your PIN they then have access to your money.

Other versions of this scam include:

- Asking you to withdraw a large sum of cash which the police will mark and return to the banking system in an effort to identify a corrupt banking person – once you hand over the cash to the courier - it is gone
 - Scammers have also realised now that when a more vulnerable person goes into the Bank to withdraw large sums of cash the Bank staff become suspicious so the Scammer may tell the victim to withdraw the cash in Euros from a Foreign Exchange outlet
 - A person claiming to be a police officer and is investigating sales of counterfeit goods then asks you to buy an expensive item such as a watch or jewellery from a specific retailer. You are then asked to hand it over to the Courier to deliver to the “Police” and again that is the last you see or hear of it.
 - A further common variation is to tell you your bank account has been compromised and you need to transfer all your money into a “Safe Account”. Once again you have delivered your cash directly to the Scammer.
- Protect yourself
- Your bank or the police will never call you to ask you to verify your personal details or PIN by phone or offer to pick up your card by courier. Hang up if you get a call like this.
 - If you need to call your bank back to check, wait five minutes; fraudsters may stay on the line after you hang up. Alternatively, use a different line altogether to call your bank.
 - If you think you have been scammed use the dedicated “159” telephone number for direct access to your Bank.

Take Five To Stop Fraud

STOP: Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

CHALLENGE: Could it be fake? It’s OK to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

PROTECT: Contact your bank immediately if you think you’ve fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud

ALWAYS REMEMBER:

- Avoid disclosing security details
- Emails, Phone Calls and Texts may not be authentic
- Always make direct contact with any organisation by using a genuine phone number
- Stop and Challenge any unexpected requests
- Protect others by reporting Fraud and Scams

West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner Report

The full results of the West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner’s Town & Parish Council Survey have been published. The PCC is grateful to have heard from a record number of 182 councils, an increase of 30% from last year, about their feelings on policing. If you’re interested to see the results, please read below. Further, if you would be able to share with your local community any your relevant platforms, e.g. website, newsletter, or social media, it would be appreciated.

In **South Worcestershire**, over a quarter (33%) of respondents agree West Mercia Police is working well with councils to identify and address local crime and disorder issues.

Other results from respondents included:

- 28% state they agree/strongly agree that they have confidence in the police to tackle local crime and disorder issues.
- Three-quarters (72%) explained police have been in contact to identify priorities as a town/parish council.
- 43% explained the police have acted upon the priorities set out.
- 50% explained they find it fairly easy/very easy to access their local policing teams.
- 38% believe that anti-social behaviour is a fairly big/very big problem in their area.

Over three-quarters (77%) state road safety is a fairly big/very big problem, alongside criminal damage/vandalism (31%).

PCC John Campion said: *“As PCC, my pledge is clear to ensure everyone from all corners of our communities has a voice, and it’s heard at the highest level in policing. This survey allows me to understand the concerns of communities across West Mercia, and I will ensure they are acted upon.*

“It’s welcome to see that councils in Worcestershire believe West Mercia Police is doing work of value within the community and they feel they are being heard. However, I acknowledge it could always be better as I want all residents to feel they are safe in their community by befitting from the investment I have made to provide West Mercia Police with a record number of officers and for residents to believe the force is delivering a high-quality service that both they and I expect them to.”
