

'If Candlemas Day be dry and fair, The half of winter is to come, And more. If Candlemas Day be wet and foul, The half of winter is gone At Yule!'

The month has many dates that herald the stirrings of Spring or the beginnings of a New Year in the Far East!

- **February 1st** : In the Christian Calendar this is St Brigid's Day.
- February 2nd : Candlemas Day in the Christian Calendar or in the old Celtic Calendar, it is the feast of Imbolc. This is when Spring returns and the maiden earth awakens once more.
- February 10th : Chinese New Year. The year of the Green Wooden Dragon 3/2. It is a symbol of happiness.
- **February 13th** : Shrove Tuesday / Pancake Day.

Plant Rhubarb crowns. Prune Autumn Cropping Raspberry bushes, Gooseberry bushes and Currant bushes. Prune Apple,



Pear, Quince and Medlar trees. At the end of February if the ground is not frozen plant Broad Bean seeds into the earth and cover with cloches.

And finally it's **National Nest Box Week** from the 14th to 21st February. This is really the last time to get nest boxes up before nesting really begins.

espite overflowing rivers, streams, ditches, despite sodden gardens, despite endless rain at the beginning of the month, the first leaves of bulbs are starting to emerge.



And despite all the wet, the cold, the disappearance of cheerful Christmas decorations and lights, a goodly crowd emerged for the annual wassail on January 7th. We squelched across the recreation field towards the welcoming warmth of

firepit, banging saucepan lids, blowing and shaking a variety of instruments and commiserating with Ken who had managed to fall over into the mud! The orchard trees were blessed with toast, smoke, song and cider so there's no need to worry about them in 2024!



It is hard to imagine Pebworth without trees – we are used now to the birch trees at the memorial area, the native trees of the Queen's canopy, the fruit trees at the allotments all of which PIB has added to the village landscape – but what a terrible shock for everyone in the early 1970s when the huge mature elm trees here had to be felled. Mags Phillips sent us this reminder of the response :

"Plant a tree in'73, plant some more in '74. The elm tree was nicknamed the weed of Warwickshire, but in the early 1970s it was devastated by Dutch Elm Disease. We lost them all. We lived in Pebworth at this time so my late husband Nigel Phillips and John Forsyth, who lived in Broad Marston, gathered a team of great willing helpers and decided to replant scores of trees. These are everywhere in the parish and are now wonderful mature 50 year old specimens! Most special to me are the ones round the Close, especially the London planes, the ones at the top of the village (leading to Little Meadows) and so many along the parish boundary, especially near Dorsington." Thank you Mags.

The answer to the question "When is the best time to plant a tree?" is "20 years ago".

And another question we hope you can help us answer is "Which birds are thriving in Pebworth?". So far we have installed 16 bird boxes, 9 more specifically to encourage swifts and 3 for owls. The annual Bird Watch survey is taking place from 26th to 28th January – record the species and number of birds you see in one hour and, as well as sharing your results with the RSPB, please can you send them to Yvonne via email (ken.w.wood@btinternet.com). Last year goldfinches were the top of Pebworth's list.

Birds are on our mind too for our annual Conservation Talk at Pebworth Village Hall. Please put **Sunday 18th February 3pm** in your diaries. The title "How to be a Bad birdwatcher " is intriguing, isn't it ? Come along to find out more and enjoy a Worcestershire cream tea for £5. Children free. There will also be a Snatch and Grab raffle – sounds even more intriguing !



Home Upgrade Grant phase 2 (HUG2) What is HUG2?

The Government-funded scheme is designed to improve the comfort and energy efficiency of lower income homes that are not connected to mains gas for central heating (off gas) and have an EPC rating of D or below.

Worcestershire County Council is working in partnership with Redditch Borough and Bromsgrove, Malvern Hills and Wychavon District Councils to deliver this project. The project will end in March 2025.

Worcester City Council and Wyre Forest District Council are administering their own HUG2 scheme and information can be found on their websites.

Who is Eligible?

Homeowners and private tenants may be eligible if they meet the following criteria:

- Have a household income of £31,000 or less, or the property is located in a government defined low-income postcode.
- Have an EPC rating of a D or below for homes that do not have a current/valid EPC certificate, an assessment can be funded if they meet all other criteria,
- The property doesn't have mains gas central heating,
- Pay council tax to Redditch Borough, or Bromsgrove, Malvern Hill or Wychavon District Councils. Those who are exempt will be asked to provide other evidence to satisfy they have an eligible postcode.

Landlords may also be eligible if they own less than 4 properties but will be asked to contribute at least one third of the total cost of the measures installed. The tenant must also meet the above Low-income criteria.

Installations may be subject to permission being granted. This may include planning permission or listed building consent.

How are we promoting this scheme?

We have been looking at low income and EPC data

to identify some potentially eligible properties. These will receive direct communication about the scheme.

A wider marketing campaign will help us to reach other households along with working with community partners including parish councils, charities and community groups and collaborating with existing cost of living support schemes.

What types of measures can be considered?

The project has a 'fabric first' approach which prioritises insulation and may require improved ventilation to meet installation quality standards (PAS2035/PAS2030).

The funding prioritises certain energy efficiency measures including:

External/internal wall insulation Loft insulation/room in roof insulation Cavity wall insulation Air source heat pumps Hot water cylinder insulation and thermostat Digital/smart heating controls Other measures may be recommended such as: solar PV; low energy lighting; underfloor insulation; double glazing; night storage heaters; high temperature heat pumps; solar thermal, direct electric heaters, high retention storage heaters.

All measures are subject to a government value-formoney assessment and available funds.

An eligible home will need a survey to determine the most suitable energy efficiency measures.

All works and services carried out will be undertaken in compliance with the latest versions of PAS 2030 and PAS 2035, TrustMark and the Microgeneration Certification Scheme (MCS), where applicable. All contractors will be appointed for the delivery of the project.

On-call firefighters required for Pebworth Fire Station

ereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Service (HWFRS) is looking for more on-call firefighters to cover Pebworth Fire Station.

Anyone interested in the paid role must be aged over 18, live or work within five minutes of the Stratford Road station and be able to respond to emergency calls whenever needed.

The surrounding area includes a maximumsecurity prison, high-speed railway lines, recycling centres and other local manufacturing businesses found on the industrial sites.

Pebworth is staffed solely by on-call firefighters who are professionals from a wide range of backgrounds which can prove helpful when responding to incidents.

The station boasts a Dennis Sabre fire engine, which is a first-line attack appliance, carrying a crew of up to six firefighters along with



firefighting and rescue equipment.

The building and facilities are still relatively recent having been built in 2011 to replace the previous structure in Broad Marston Road. HWFRS is looking to recruit enthusiastic, community-minded applicants from all walks of life for the on-call roles.

The most important qualifications are common sense, compassion, commitment, discretion and teamwork.

Potential firefighters must be available on Tuesday evenings for drill nights which are weekly training sessions at the Pebworth station starting at 7pm.

HWFRS offers a range of contracts where the number of hours and times to be available on-call can vary to suit personal and professional circumstances.

Full training, uniform and personal development are provided alongside many opportunities to gain additional skills and qualifications that will be of use outside the Service.

The Service only asks for an average level of strength and fitness and will provide full support in helping people understand and achieve this.

Open Forum: The Chairman suspended the formal meeting for the Ward Members and public participation.

- Queries were raised regarding flooding on Friday Street and grip clearance works, particularly along Honeybourne Rd outside Wesley Gardens. Cllr Weller advised that the Cllr Cranage is looking into various issues around flooding.
- a) County Councillor Adams sent his apologies and provided a report which is appended to the minutes.
- b) District Councillor Ciotti advised that -

The Chairman closed the open forum and reconvened the meeting at 19:05

Planning Matters:

- a) W/23/02296/FUL Removal of existing agricultural buildings and replacement with a 2 bedroom dormer bungalow and garaging at Meadowbank Farm Dorsington Road Dorsington Pebworth Stratford Upon Avon CV37 8XB. Following the December Parish Council meeting the following comments were made :
 - The development is outside the SWDP2 Development Boundary.
 - It is adjacent to the Pebworth Conservation Area.
 - As this will be the first dwelling that would be seen on entering the village from the north from the direction of Dorsington Village please ensure compliance with the Design Code (P3 page 33) of Pebworth Neighbourhood Development Plan.

Decisions:

- b) W/23/01487/HP Proposal: Extension and renovation to existing property. Location: Far View, Back Lane, Pebworth, Stratford Upon Avon, CV37 8XA. Application Approved.
- c) W/23/02224/HP Erection of single-storey rear extension, conversion of garage to ancillary accommodation, replacement windows and other external alterations. Location: The Old Barn, Back Lane, Pebworth, Stratford Upon Avon, CV37 8XA. Application Approved.

<u>County Councillor Report</u> – Pebworth Month: January 2024 Prepared by Alastair Adams Littletons Division, Worcestershire County Council

Dear Residents,

Not a lot to report so far this month. The County Council is still in the middle of Budget setting for 2024/25. It looks like your council tax will be increased by 4.94% (2% ring-fenced for adult social care and 2.94% to deal with all the other services). As mentioned last month there has been a large the increase in pressures from Children and Adult services. For example, the home to school transport has increased by nearly £10m in the last 12 months due to the increase in the number of children with Special Educational Needs, and many of them requiring transport to schools outside of the county. However, as mentioned last month, our investment in roads and pavements will continue at the same high level as previous years to keep them some of the best in the UK.

By next month the budget should be finalised and I can tell you more.

NEW drains under the Honeybourne Bridges. WCC Highways cleaned the debris/mud from the right hand side of the first bridge which was causing pooling of water partly across the road. This will need to be monitored as debris and mud gets washed off the fields onto the road and ultimately ends up in these new drains.

Other updates on flooding – Broad Marston: As mentioned last month, I have asked the Pebworth Parish Council to see if there any monies left from the Cala Homes Flood alleviation maintenance fund (£5000) to help clear the ditch opposite Cotswold View. They have come back and agreed in principle to get this work done and to use the soil to build a bund in the field to stop water flowing onto the road.

Other updates on flooding – Honeybourne: See the drone photographs of the flood plain upstream in Honeybourne before the Gate Pub which held back a huge amount of water - estimated on holding back over 10,000 gallons of water. If this flood plain had not been built in the last 18 months, the pub would



have been flooded.

In places the water was 5ft deep. The tiny figure on the bank in a fluorescent coat is me !

Highways:

There are still some road and footway maintenance in progress in Worcestershire please check

<u>https://one.network/</u> to see all the temporary road closures on a regular basis.

 Sunken road opposite the entrance to Pebworth Nursery. WCC are going to dig to investigate. Date set for April but they will try and do it sooner. I have added pressure to get it done ASAP because in the recent cold spell the water turned to ice and thus very dangerous – see below



- Dropped kerbs requested opposite 2, and 3, Chapel Road for mobility scooter. Order given to proceed and install – no date given yet.
- I had a meeting in November with Severn Trent and again reminded them about the foul sewer manhole in School Rd and Friday St which suffer foul water coming up through the manhole when we had the heavy rainfall recently. They have promised to take action. I have chased again, and got a reply saying they are looking into it!
- Flooding at Chalk Farm , Buckle Street –Ditch on RHS to be dug out by farmer and new grips dug by WCC
- Welford Bridge Closed
