#### A Journey of Passion and Perseverance: The Story of Artist Wendi Weller

n a peaceful corner of Pebworth, a dedicated artist has been quietly making moves within the British Art scene.

In 2019, as the pandemic took hold, Wendi set up a dog portrait business called 'Molly & Maud' with friend and fellow artist Denise Liebermann. As pet portraits became popular, it was a fantastic opportunity to create art throughout lockdown.

In 2023 Wendi was thrilled when one of her dog portraits was chosen for the advertising banner for Broadway Arts Festival.

The festival, which is a charity, was started in 2010 and aims to raise awareness of the community's rich links with the arts. The festival is creating a sustainable environment within which to inspire, educate, encourage and support Broadway as an internationally recognised centre for the arts.



A couple of years on and inspired by her garden, Wendi now paints vibrant abstract botanical art and contemporary still life in oil.

In her abstract botanical pieces, Wendi invites viewers into a



wonderful world of vivid imagination and emotion. Through bold brush strokes, an explosion of colour, and an intuitive sense of movement; she transforms botanicals into abstract form, transcending traditional style.



At the other end of the spectrum, Wendi channels a different energy into her still life work. In her oil

paintings, she embraces delicate detail and subtle nuances introducing bold colour and expressive mark making. The result is a series of work that brings a deep



appreciation of the innate beauty found in the simplicity of the botanical world.

Wendi is now living her dream of becoming a full-time artist, currently exhibiting in two esteemed Cotswold galleries: Spencer House Gallery, Tetbury and Burford Garden Company.

The source of inspiration for many of Wendi's paintings is her beautiful garden. She opens the garden and studio each year to raise money for the National Garden scheme and its supporting charities which in Pebworth, collectively, has raised in excess of £20,000 in the last 7 years.

In addition to her art work Wendi is a dedicated teacher. Sharing her knowledge and passion with aspiring artists of any age, teaching workshops in 'Painting Abstract Florals', 'Draw and

St Paul's Day is January 25th!



It should be a deep, reflective time to rest and retreat like Nature is doing. The month is traditionally one of the coldest of the year when the frosts are heavy and we experience some snow fall. #### **Our Starry Skies!**

At the beginning of the month Venus will be visible each morning from 5.30am onwards for about two hours, and in the evening Jupiter will be seen in the cold dusky skies at around 5pm. And look out on the evenings of January 3rd to 4th for the Quadrantid Meteor Shower. It will be best be seen from 7pm on the 3rd through to 6am on the 4th. The meteors appear to radiate from the constellation Boötes near The Plough.

January's Full Moon is known as the Wolf Moon and is at its peak on 25th January.

The first new moon of 2024 is on January 11th.



#### **Gardening in January**



This advice applies after the rising of The Wolf Moon.

A time to chit potatoes.

Plant garlic bulbs and rhubarb crowns if ground is not frozen.

Sow onions and leeks in seed trays.

Plant bare root roses and fruit trees.


#### Youth & Ambition



The Home Upgrade Grant is ready!

Government funding is now available for free energy improvements to make homes warmer and reduce energy bills for eligible households in Worcestershire.

If your annual household income is £31,000 or less and you are not connected to mains gas for heating, then you could be eligible.

### You may be eligible for the Home Upgrade Grant if you meet all the following criteria:

- Your property is not connected to the mains gas network for heating
- Your household income is £31,000 or less or live in a defined low income Government postcode
- Pay council tax to one of the following: Bromsgrove District or Redditch Borough Council, Malvern Hills District Council, or Wychavon District Council
- You own the home you live in or are a tenant in the private rented sector\*
- Your home has an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating D or below. You can check online at www.epcregister.com.\*\*
- \* Funding is available for private rental landlords with 4 or less properties. NB a financial contribution of at least 33% is required Contact Act on Energy for full eligibility criteria.
- \*\*If you are eligible, we will provide you with a free EPC assessment

If you qualify for the scheme, your property will undergo a free technical survey to see which measures would improve its energy efficiency the most.

#### Priority measures may include:









Wall insulation

Loft insulation

Cavity wall insulation

Air source heat pumps



Hot water cylinder insulation & thermostat



Heating control upgrades



Solar PV



Draft proofing

Secondary measures may include: Low energy lighting, Underfloor insulation, Double glazing and External doors.

### Home Upgrade Grant phase 2 (HUG2) What is HUG2?

The Government-funded scheme is designed to improve the comfort and energy efficiency of lower income homes that are not connected to mains gas for central heating (off gas) and have an EPC rating of D or below.

Worcestershire County Council is working in partnership with Redditch Borough and Bromsgrove, Malvern Hills and Wychavon District Councils to deliver this project. The project will end in March 2025.

Worcester City Council and Wyre Forest District Council are administering their own HUG2 scheme and information can be found on their websites.

#### Who is Eligible?

Homeowners and private tenants may be eligible if they meet the following criteria:

- Have a household income of £31,000 or less, or the property is located in a government defined low-income postcode.
- Have an EPC rating of a D or below for homes that do not have a current/valid EPC certificate, an assessment can be funded if they meet all other criteria,
- The property doesn't have mains gas central heating,
- Pay council tax to Redditch Borough, or Bromsgrove, Malvern Hill or Wychavon District Councils. Those who are exempt will be asked to provide other evidence to satisfy they have an eligible postcode.

Landlords may also be eligible if they own less than 4 properties but will be asked to contribute at least one third of the total cost of the measures installed. The tenant must also meet the above Low-income criteria.

Installations may be subject to permission being granted. This may include planning permission or listed building consent.

#### How are we promoting this scheme?

We have been looking at low income and EPC data

to identify some potentially eligible properties. These will receive direct communication about the scheme.

A wider marketing campaign will help us to reach other households along with working with community partners including parish councils, charities and community groups and collaborating with existing cost of living support schemes.

#### What types of measures can be considered?

The project has a 'fabric first' approach which prioritises insulation and may require improved ventilation to meet installation quality standards (PAS2035/PAS2030).

The funding prioritises certain energy efficiency measures including:

External/internal wall insulation
Loft insulation/room in roof insulation
Cavity wall insulation
Air source heat pumps
Hot water cylinder insulation and thermostat
Digital/smart heating controls
Other measures may be recommended sur

Other measures may be recommended such as: solar PV; low energy lighting; underfloor insulation; double glazing; night storage heaters; high temperature heat pumps; solar thermal, direct electric heaters, high retention storage heaters.

All measures are subject to a government value-formoney assessment and available funds.

An eligible home will need a survey to determine the most suitable energy efficiency measures.

All works and services carried out will be undertaken in compliance with the latest versions of PAS 2030 and PAS 2035, TrustMark and the Microgeneration Certification Scheme (MCS), where applicable. All contractors will be appointed for the delivery of the project.

#### On-call firefighters required for Pebworth Fire Station

ereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Service (HWFRS) is looking for more on-call firefighters to cover Pebworth Fire Station.

Anyone interested in the paid role must be aged over 18, live or work within five minutes of the Stratford Road station and be able to respond to emergency calls whenever needed.

The surrounding area includes a maximumsecurity prison, high-speed railway lines, recycling centres and other local manufacturing businesses found on the industrial sites.

Pebworth is staffed solely by on-call firefighters who are professionals from a wide range of backgrounds which can prove helpful when responding to incidents.

The station boasts a Dennis Sabre fire engine, which is a first-line attack appliance, carrying a crew of up to six firefighters along with



firefighting and rescue equipment.

The building and facilities are still relatively recent having been built in 2011 to replace the previous structure in Broad Marston Road.

HWFRS is looking to recruit enthusiastic, community-minded applicants from all walks of life for the on-call roles.

The most important qualifications are common sense, compassion, commitment, discretion and teamwork.

Potential firefighters must be available on Tuesday evenings for drill nights which are weekly training sessions at the Pebworth station starting at 7pm.

The Service only asks for an average level of strength and fitness and will provide full support in helping people understand and achieve this.

#### **Apologies Considered for Absence:**

Cllrs Cotton and Pearson – approved

**Open Forum:** The Chairman suspended the formal meeting for the Ward Members and public participation.

- Query was raised regarding flooding on Friday Street. There has been no update from Severn Trent Water. Resident is extremely upset regarding foul water overflowing close (and sometimes in) to his property when there is heavy rain. The Parish Council acknowledged that the system cannot cope, and Severn Trent Water has been made aware several times. He stated that this has become worse since the pumping station was installed. Cllr Weller advised that monies will be put into the budget to look at the overall flooding in that area. District Councillor Robson has some contacts at Severn Trent Water and is happy to support the Parish Council and residents.
- Two new watering cans have been purchased as replacements at the burial ground.
- a) County Councillor Adams sent his apologies.
- b) District Councillor Robson continues to chase planning for responses.
   District Councillor Ciotti sent her apologies and provided the following report:

- Community Transport (Evesham Volunteer Centre) would like to visit to publicise the private car/ volunteer driver service they provide in the Evesham area including Pebworth. The clerk suggested they would reach more people by attending Coffee on the Close so has put them in touch with Cllr Jodi Cotton.
- Meanwhile I have been finding out about public transport as Pebworth is not well served. Wychavon's funding offer has not been taken up in this area by community groups so it has been paused while the strategy is reviewed. Demand Responsive Transport (DRC) is a WCC initiative supplying funding to help residents in rural areas without car or bus options to request individual journeys by minibus. It has been successfully piloted in Bromsgrove and in June another pilot began in the Malvern Hills area. This could be offered in the Pebworth area in the future if a need is demonstrated. Pebworth could be the case study in this ward because it is, I believe, the parish most poorly served by public transport. There would be a consultation report in the first instance. Wychavon DC is waiting for more details from WCC.
- Severe Weather Emergency Protocol:

#### **Considered:**

a) Meadowbank Farm, Dorsington Road, CV37 8XB: Removal of existing agricultural buildings and replacement with a 2 bedroom dormer bungalow and garaging. Following discussion Cllr Cranage to forward comments to the Clerk for onward transmission to Planning.

#### Considered between meetings:

- b) The Old Barn, Back Lane, Pebworth, CV37 8XA: Erection of single-storey rear extension, conversion of garage to ancillary accommodation, replacement windows and other external alterations. Following consultation via email Clerk responded with: The Parish Council notes that this dwelling is within the Conservation Area and on the Conservation Area Appraisal Map is categorised as "an unlisted building of local distinction".
- c) Elm View, Chapel Road, Pebworth, , CV37 8XJ: Demolition of existing dwelling and construction of nine dwellings, creation of new vehicular access into site along with private driveways and gardens, alteration and extension of retained outbuilding at Elm View and alteration and extension of Walnut Tree Cottage. Following the last Parish Council meeting comments are available viewed to be at: https://plan.wychavon.gov.uk/Planning/Display/ W/23/02156/FUL Copies are available from the Clerk.

#### **Decisions:**

- d) The Forge, Back Lane, Pebworth: A dilapidated, old stable building that is no longer used would be demolished and rebuilt into an outbuilding as a living space with one bedroom and a kitchen/living room area as open plan for extra accommodation for family use. Approved Subject to Conditions.
- e) Cherry Orchard, Back Lane, Pebworth, Two storey front extension, and first floor rear and side extensions. Planning Refused.

- To accept the Community Grant application form and terms and conditions with minor changes.
   Clerk to place on website.

- d) To defer the update from Cllr Cranage regarding flooding Friday St once he has spoken with County Cllr Adams to the January meeting.

Members noted the damaged manhole cover opposite The Masons Arms to Severn Trent Water has been repaired.

Cllr Shiers reported that a quote has been provided for £450 to clear the ditch at The Close. It was resolved to accept the quote. Clerk has received acknowledgement that Rooftop Housing will share the costs.

I hope you all had a lovely Christmas and I wish you a wonderful 2024.

At the start of the New Year, we can look forward to another 12 months of Pebworth community activities – there is always something going on in our village and surrounding area and this is the time to plan ahead; why not join one of the many clubs, or join in at the local pub playing crib? Or just pop in to the pub and meet up with friends.

Please put in you diary Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> September 2024 which is the date for the **Pebworth Party in the Park** which I am sure will be another fantastic day of fun, frolics and festivities.

#### **County Council News**

At this time of the year the County Council is setting its budget for 2024/25 year. It looks like it is going to be a year of hard choices as pressures on the council are increasing with the aging population and the increased pressures on Children Services. For example, when I was first elected over 10 years ago, the number of children in Council care was around 400. Today it is 1089 and the cost is nudging £100m per year.

Many councils around the country are feeling the same pinch and have cancelled many vital services such as mending the potholes! However, in Worcestershire, we will continue to invest in our roads and pavements over the coming 12 months to keep them some of the best in the UK. We are also always looking to be more efficient and cost effective, and we are continuing to do this in 2024.

#### NEW drains under the Honeybourne Bridges

Owl Homes did manage to use their road sweeper to clean the debris under the bridges in December, but we will need to keep an eye on the debris and mud that gets washed off the fields onto the road and ultimately ends up in these new drains.

#### Other updates on flooding - Broad Marston

Still a little fine tuning to the inlets into the 2 x Flood plains is needed to help the flood plains take great capacity. Hopefully this will happen in Spring.

There was some water on the road in front of the Broad Marston Manor entrance, but the road was still passable. This water was mostly coming from the field opposite Cotswold View. A few years ago, the ditch on the right hand side (as you drive out of Broad Marston) was dug out and the soil used to build a bund in the field. This bund has now eroded and disappeared, and in my opinion this ditch needs digging out again, and the soil used to rebuild the bund.

I have asked the Pebworth Parish Council to see if there any monies left from the Cala Homes Flood alleviation maintenance fund (£5000) to help clear this ditch. They paid for it last time to be done, and I would strongly recommend they do it again. I spoke to Nick Farmer who did it last time and he is happy to quote to do it again.

#### Other updates on flooding - Honeybourne

Honeybourne PROW volunteers have agreed to dig out the ditches along the High Street. Also some of the outlets under the raised pavement have been blocked off on a temporary basis to see if that stops water coming back onto the road from the brook.

#### Network Rail gives the green light to the new Honeybourne Railway Station Car Park

I am keeping pressure on the WDC and Network Rail to complete this project, and I'm chasing them every month.

#### **Highways:**

There are still some road and footway maintenance in progress in Worcestershire please check <a href="https://one.network/">https://one.network/</a> to see all the temporary road closures on a regular basis.

- I have reported the sunken road opposite the entrance to Pebworth Nursery to Highways.
   WCC are going to dig to investigate. No date set when.
- Dropped kerbs requested opposite 2, and 3, Chapel Road for mobility scooter. Order given to proceed and install – no date given yet.

- I had a meeting in November with Severn Trent and again reminded them about the foul sewer manhole in School Rd and Friday St which suffered foul water coming up through the manhole when we had the heavy rainfall recently. They have promised to take action. I have heard nothing since so I will chase.
- Flooding at Chalk Farm, Buckle Street –Ditch on RHS to be dug out by farmer and new grips dug by WCC

#### What have we been up to?

Officers have conducted various drop-in sessions across the area. Please keep an eye on social media and Neighbourhood Matters for future dates. Even if the session is not in your village, you are more than welcome to attend any drop-in session to speak with us. This is a great way for you to understand what we are doing in your village, and if there is something

that you believe we are not doing, it's a great way to tell us.

Officers have attended various schools within the area to do presentations on topics such as antisocial behaviour (ASB), hate crime and social media. We have also held a drop-in session within a school lunch time which proved very popular with the students. We had approx. 50 students come and speak to us about various topics. It's a great to engage with people who may not get a chance to see us normally.

We have also held various meetings with agencies we work closely with such as Housing Associations and Trading Standards. Multi agency working is vital for us in order to share intelligence and build on our already great relationship. You will have seen recently on our Facebook page that we recently seized approximately £14,000 worth of illegal vapes, counterfeit cigarettes from shops in Evesham town centre. As well as multi-agency working, the Safer Neighbourhood team have attended a cross border meeting with Warwickshire, Thames Valley and Gloucestershire police forces. Again, this is vital as it allows intelligence to be shared between the forces regarding a variety of issues/nominals. These meetings are extremely helpful in sharing information to combat cross border crime.

All of the above is sent through Neighbourhood Matters as well as any engagement sessions we run. We are encouraging people to sign up to this service as it's a great way of finding out what we are up to and where we will be. Please ensure you sign up to this free service.
