

#### A VILLAGE ALMANAC

'If the Geese on St Martin's Day ( November 11th ) do slide on ice, at Christmas they will walk in mud.'

In the old Roman Calendar, November was the ninth month of the year which began with March, and November 11th marked the beginning of Winter! During Anglo Saxon times, November was known as 'Blod-Monath' as this was the month in which the cattle were slaughtered to honour the Gods.

As the temperature dips during the days and nights of November, the month signifies a big change for two of of our native species. Bats, still seen feasting nightly in October, go into hibernation for the winter. They don't breed or hibernate in the same place and require a 'hibernacula roost' to be cool and dry and stable. There is some evidence to suggest that members of the pipistrelle group are venturing further afield to continental Europe to overwinter before returning in the Spring.





November is the month when fox cubs permanently leave their mothers and venture out further afield to find their own territories and mates. The healthiest of young foxes usually travel the furthest as they have built up fat reserves and are keen to establish their own territories and families while the runts of a litter don't travel as far and sometimes never establish a territory but become subordinates and help a dominant pair of foxes look after their cubs.





#### Welcome Vikki And Rob!

Most people are unaware that she was the first female author to be published in the English language, that she was a highly educated woman, a keen follower of the Protestant religion and was trusted to be put in charge of the country when Henry VIII travelled to France. She was a caring stepmother to his three children and nursed him to the end of his life when she was finally free to marry the man she had loved for many years. Her interesting life ended after a few years of happy marriage and a baby daughter when she died at Sudeley Castle where she is buried. This was a very interesting story of a Tudor queen that we know more about now.





#### On-call firefighters required for Pebworth Fire Station

service (HWFRS) is looking for more on-call firefighters to cover Pebworth Fire Station.

Anyone interested in the paid role must be aged over 18, live or work within five minutes of the Stratford Road station and be able to respond to emergency calls whenever needed.

The surrounding area includes a maximumsecurity prison, high-speed railway lines, recycling centres and other local manufacturing businesses found on the industrial sites.

Pebworth is staffed solely by on-call firefighters who are professionals from a wide range of backgrounds which can prove helpful when responding to incidents.

The station boasts a Dennis Sabre fire engine, which is a first-line attack appliance, carrying a crew of up to six firefighters along with



firefighting and rescue equipment.

The building and facilities are still relatively recent having been built in 2011 to replace

the previous structure in Broad Marston Road.

HWFRS is looking to recruit enthusiastic, community-minded applicants from all walks of life for the on-call roles.

The most important qualifications are common sense, compassion, commitment, discretion and teamwork.

Potential firefighters must be available on Tuesday evenings for drill nights which are weekly training sessions at the Pebworth station starting at 7pm.

HWFRS offers a range of contracts where the number of hours and times to be available on-call can vary to suit personal and professional circumstances.

Full training, uniform and personal development are provided alongside many opportunities to gain additional skills and qualifications that will be of use outside the Service.

The Service only asks for an average level of strength and fitness and will provide full support in helping people understand and achieve this.

#### **Next Meeting:**

6<sup>th</sup> November 2023, 7pm at Pebworth Village Hall

**Present:** Councillors: Richard Weller, James Pearson, David Cranage & Jodi Cotton

In attendance: County Councillor Adams & District Councillor Hannah Robson, Mrs D Bowles (Clerk)

Also in attendance: 5 members of the public.

#### **Apologies Considered for Absence:**

Cllrs Shiers and Parkins - approved

**Open Forum:** The Chairman suspended the formal meeting for the Ward Members and public participation.

- a) 5 members of the public were in attendance:
  - Resident thanked the Parish Council for help regarding the proposed dropped kerb and the lifting of the canopies of the trees on The Close.
  - Complaint regarding a resident in Elm Close; although this is not something the Parish Council can be involved with, the Clerk will inform the local police officer.
  - Query raised regarding the VAS data. Cllr Weller advised this is being monitored and the data is provided in the minutes.
  - An update was given regarding the recent meeting with Meon Way Residents Association and Persimmon Homes. Minutes are provided as Appendix B.
  - District Councillor Robson had a meeting with the police regarding Meon Way Gardens. They have agreed they will drive around Meon Way when they are in Pebworth. She has suggested a mobile police van to perhaps carry out a surgery for residents. A resident stated there does

seem to have been a better police presence recently.

- Welford Bridge is being closed; Cllr Cotton will provide the predicted closure dates which will be appended at the end of the minutes (Appendix C)
- b) County Councillor Adams arrived 19:45.
- c) District Councillor Ciotti sent her apologies. She is currently investigating the issue with the dog bins at Meon Way Gardens.

The Chairman closed the open forum and reconvened the meeting at 19:30

#### **District Councillor Robson reported:**

Wychavon District Council are pushing a drive on food waste and recycling.

The South Worcestershire Development Plan has been formally submitted to the Secretary of State for independent examination.

#### **Planning Matters:**

- a) 14 Middlesex, Pebworth Road, Ullington, Pebworth, CV37 8XF: Hobby workshop (part retrospective). Following discussion Clerk to respond "No comment".
- b) Ryknild, Buckle Street, Honeybourne, WR11 8QQ: Erection of garage, workshop and storage building. Following discussion Clerk to respond "No comment".
- c) Cherry Orchard, Back Lane, Pebworth, CV37 8XA: Two storey front extension, and first floor rear and side extensions. Cllr Weller declared an interest in this application and did not take part in responses. Following consultation via email Clerk responded with –

"Whilst Pebworth Parish Council has no problem with the principle of redeveloping and expanding the existing property we would ask that the Planning Officer check the design and materials comply with the Design Policy P3, page 33 of the Pebworth Parish Neighbourhood Plan.

Should you be minded to approve this application the Parish Council would like consideration given to neighbouring and nearby property owners in relation to appropriate traffic and construction management conditions, eg working hours, washing of tyres as the site is at the end of a narrow, single track road with other properties also being improved upon."

d) Hill House, Pebworth Road, Ullington, Pebworth CV37 8XG: Single-storey extension to rear, first-floor extension to side, new dormer windows and external alterations. Following consultation via email Clerk responded with "No Comment".

#### **Decisions**:

- a) Installation of 24 Ground Aligned Photovoltaic Solar Panels at Low Furrow Farmhouse, Low Furrow Farm, Dorsington Road, Dorsington, Pebworth, Stratford Upon Avon, CV37 8AP. Application Approved Subject to Conditions.
- b) Construction of detached garage/garden store/workshop (part Pebworth Parish Council retrospective) at Mobile Home At Sunnycroft, Pebworth Road, Ullington, Application Approved Subject to Conditions.
- c) Removal of Condition 4 on granted planning approval W/12/01027 Replacement dwelling Mobile Home at Sunnycroft, Pebworth Road, Ullington, Pebworth. **Application Refused.**

#### Finance:

#### It was **resolved** to:

- a) to purchase a Parish Council wreath regarding Remembrance Day
- approve the second quarterly bank reconciliation, account balances and income and expenditure budgets. Cllr Cotton initialled.

Members noted new 24 month mobile contract has been signed at £7.70 pm which is a 50% reduction.

#### **Council & Community Matters:**

- a) A works order has been given to lift the crowns on the 12 trees on Chapel Rd. These works will take place at the end of Oct/beg of Nov when the trees are dormant.
- b) Update still awaited regarding dog bins on Meon Way Gardens.
- c) Update following meeting with Persimmon Homes on 29th September was discussed during Open Forum.
- **d)** Policing situation at Meon Way Gardens was discussed during Open Forum.

SIMS Metals appear to be working past 9pm which is in contravention of planning. District Councillor Robson will take this forward with Enforcement.

**County Councillor Adams arrived at 19:45**. The Chairman suspended the meeting for a report to be provided which is appended to the minutes.

Broadway volunteers finished putting in the flood alleviation works at the Heart of England Forest.

Extra drainage system has been installed and it is hoped the flooding has been solved under Honeybourne bridges.

Grant provided for the Village Hall.

It has been agreed for a temporary pedestrian crossing for the proposed Honeybourne Railway Station car park.

Street cleaning works to be requested by District Councillor Robson.

The Chairman reconvened the meeting at 20:10

#### The Close & Recreation Field

- a) Members noted the remedial works have now been completed and the remaining balance can now be paid.
- b) Clerk to place a reminder in the Piper & Petrus that dogs are not allowed on the Recreation ground.
- c) New numerical padlock to be bought for the Rec, Clerk to advise allotment holders of the code.

#### **Cemetery:**

Members considered the additional headstone audit report. There are 24 headstones that require immediate work with a further 18 to be re-checked in the future. It was resolved to accept the quote from Simply Stone and for Clerk to issue the works order.

#### Allotments:

Members noted allotment plot 10 has now been handed back and deposit of £20 refunded. Clerk has offered this to the next person on the list but has not received a response to date.

#### **Highway Matters:**

- a) Following the recent enquiry from a resident during the September Open Forum, Highways has raised a request with the Minor Infrastructure Projects Team to survey a single dropped crossing opposite Nos 2 and 3 Chapel Road. If accepted it may still need funding.
- b) Query raised regarding speed limit on Campden Rd B4632. Clerk to contact Warwickshire Highways.

#### **Lengthsman/Handyman Matters:**

#### a) Works carried out:

- Vegetation cleared from the Bus shelter on Broad Marston Road and a coat of fence paint given.
- Cleared the grill on The Close ditch bridge and removed debris.

#### b) Future Tasks:

- Tennis net to be taken down.

## NEW drains under the Honeybourne Bridges should help alleviate the flooding

Honeybourne Rd was closed for 2 weeks in whilst WCC installed a new network of drains on the Honeybourne side and fitted large gullys to the existing drains. See photo below.



The good news, the new drains worked! On 19<sup>th</sup> & 20<sup>th</sup> October we had really the heavy rain and widespread flooding but there was little water under the bridges, and the road was still passable. So another flood alleviation scheme that has worked.

#### Other updates on flooding form 20/10/23

The flood plain in the Heart of England field on Mickleton Rd/Broad Marston Rd worked well on the 20<sup>th</sup> Octo 2023 following the excellent work carried out by the volunteers last month. The new channel worked well, and the flood plain filled – see photo below.



As a consequence, there was hardly any water under the Broad Marston/Holt railway bridge, and the road was still passable. So another flood alleviation scheme that has worked.

The Noleham brook was still very high on 20/10/23 as you can see from the photo below, and a little fine tuning to the inlets into the 2 x Flood plains may be needed. I will liaise with the Broad Marston volunteers.



There was some water on the road in front of the Broad Marston Manor entrance, but the road was still passable. This water was mostly coming from the field opposite Cotswold View. A few years ago, the ditch on the right hand side (as you drive out of Broad Marston) was dug out and the soil used to build a bund in the field. This bund has now eroded and disappeared, and in my opinion this ditch needs digging out again, and the soil used to rebuild the bund.

In Honeybourne again there was some water on the road outside the Gate pub but the road was still passable. There was water along the High Street too but it seemed to be coming from the ditch opposite the Gate Inn, and the ditch along the High Street. I had a meeting with WDC flood engineers, and they are going to ask for these ditches to be dug out by the landowners. So the huge flood plain downstream of Honeybourne built in the last 2 years worked too.

#### Network Rail gives the green light to the new Honeybourne Railway Station Car Park

WDC bought some land opposite the platform at Honeybourne Station just off Sheenhill Rd over 4 years ago to build a new railway car park with 200+ parking spaces. Unfortunately, Network Rail wanted £4million from WDC to connect to the existing pedestrian bridge so the project was put on hold. Over the last few years I have held several meetings with representatives from Network Rail and WDC, and started a campaign of writing to the CEO of Network Rail pushing for a cheaper option. The Parish Council, the MD of WDC, and our MP all wrote to the CEO. And at last we have some progress. NR have agreed that a pedestrian level crossing from the new car park to the platform can be constructed over the redundant rail track to Long Marston so the project can go ahead at a much-reduced cost. So hopefully the new Honeybourne Railway Station car park will be built in the next 12-18 months. See below map showing the proposed crossings.



#### Highways:

There are still some road and footway maintenance in progress in Worcestershire please check <a href="https://one.network/">https://one.network/</a> to see all the temporary road closures on a regular basis. Also, please clear any debris off the road gullys near your homes to allow any rain to drain away.

- I have reported the sunken road opposite the entrance to Pebworth Nursery to Highways.
- Request to extend gritting route along Broad Marston Rd has been accepted by WCC. This will ensure there is a safe route for the school bus Chipping Campden. Awaiting the gritting routes to be updated on the WCC website.
- Dropped kerbs requested opposite 2, and 3, Chapel Road for mobility scooter. Awaiting survey and quote
- I have reported to Severn Trent the foul sewer manhole in School Rd which had foul water coming up through the manhole when we had the heavy rainfall recently.
- Flooding at Chalk Farm, Buckle Street –
   Culvert jetted, but some ditches still need to
   be dug out by the landowners/residents.
   Meeting arranged with WDC and residents.
- Noisy manhole cover opposite the Masons
   Arms reported to Severn Trent to repair.
- Welford Bridge Closed
  - > Closure: Mon 30th Oct - Fri 22nd Dec (Foot & Cycle Access only)

> Christmas - bridge open Sat 23 Dec - Mon 19 Feb

> Closure: Tue 20th Feb - Wed 19 Mar (Foot & Cycle Access only)

## <u>Ditches – IMPORTANT TO DIG OUT DITCHES TO</u> <u>REDUCE FLOODING</u>

It is the land-owners responsibility to keep their ditches working correctly. At this time of year all ditches should be inspected and where necessary dug out. The bottom of any pipes that feed into the ditches must be clear, and the bottom of the pipe should be above the bottom of the ditch.

Earlier this year a house in Dorsington Rd was flooded at junction with Long Marston Rd. The cause was unmaintained ditches. The good news is the ditches have now been dug out and all the culverts under the road checked and jetted. So please keep your ditches clear.

This proved extremely successful, and we will be doing this monthly allowing people from the villages to come and meet us in person. more than welcome to attend any drop-in session to speak with us. This is a great way for you to understand what we are doing in your village, and if there is something that you believe we are not doing, it's a great way to tell us.

Officers have been busy covering the local MOP fair in town. This was an extremely busy weekend for officers, but we were happy to see some local residents who took the time to say hi to us.

We have also been visiting every school on our patch and have dropped off SmartWater and signage. We even got a 'hello, hello, hello' from one of the primary school aged pupils at one the schools which did make us laugh.

Officers across the Evesham Safer Neighbourhood Team have been visiting vulnerable residents across all areas who are at risk of cuckooing. Cuckooing is the term used to describe the actions of gangs who travel to towns and take over the homes of vulnerable people in order to deal drugs. These visits are routine unannounced visits, with the aim to identify and proactively safeguard vulnerable drug users whose premises are likely to be used by dealers.

All of the above is sent through Neighbourhood Matters as well as any engagement sessions we run. We are encouraging people to sign up to this service as it's a great way of finding out what we are up to and where we will be. Please ensure you sign up to this free service.

#### How to Report Intelligence About Illegal Drug Use: A Guide

I'd like to talk to you about an issue that concerns us all: misuse of drugs and the illegal drug trade within our communities.

#### The Work We're Doing

I want to assure you that the West Mercia Police are tirelessly working to tackle the issue of drug misuse on multiple fronts. Not only are we committed to identifying and apprehending drug dealers, but we're also making a concerted effort to disrupt the market at its roots. Importantly, our approach isn't solely punitive; we're working in partnership with local authorities, health and social care to actively safeguard those who may be at risk of exploitation or who are vulnerable drug users.

#### Why Your Help Matters

People often hesitate to report drug activity because they're not sure if their information is relevant or significant. Rest assured, every piece of intelligence is valuable. The more information we have, the better equipped we are to understand the nature and scale of the problem, which in turn allows us to take more effective action. Please don't assume that because you think a problem is obvious or is happening regularly that the police must know about it or aren't interested in resolving it. It may well be that we need that extra piece of information from you to support a search warrant or a proactive operation.

#### What to Report

**Suspicious Activity:** Keep an eye out for unusual foot traffic at all hours, quick exchanges between people in cars or on the street, or an unusually high number of visitors to a particular address.

**Physical Evidence:** Discarded drug paraphernalia like needles, small plastic bags, or torn pieces of cling film in public spaces can also be signs of drug activity.

**Overheard Information:** Sometimes, snippets of conversation can provide valuable clues about drug deals or supply chains.

#### How to Report

**999 for Immediate Danger:** If you believe there is an immediate risk to life or property, don't hesitate to call

999. The situation may require swift intervention by the police or other emergency services.

**101 for Non-Urgent Reports:** If you want to provide information about ongoing drug activities that are not an immediate threat, you can call 101 to reach your local police.

**Online Reporting:** You can report drug intelligence via our website westmercia.police.uk and can also use our postcode search on the home page to find contact details for your neighbourhood team. Emailing your local officer is a great way to get in touch.

**Crimestoppers:** If you'd like to stay anonymous, you can call the independent UK charity, Crimestoppers, on 0800 555 111. Your anonymity is 100% guaranteed.

**Speak to us on the beat:** If you're comfortable doing so, you can always walk into your local police station to give information in person or catch a PC or PCSO on patrol for a chat in confidence.

#### Safety and Privacy

Your personal safety and privacy are of the utmost importance. All reports are treated confidentially, and you have the option to remain anonymous if you wish. Do not put yourself in harms way in the pursuit of information, trust that our expert intelligence officers will review your reports and take appropriate action to develop further leads.

#### Conclusion

Tackling drug misuse is a collective effort that requires the co-operation of all residents. By reporting what you know, you contribute to the safety and well-being of our entire community.
